Dr. Sidney Chang

Dr. Chang received his M.D. from the National Taiwan University Medical College. After graduating, he came to the United States for further training in Psychiatry. He is currently working at the VA Medical Center and is a faculty member at the Harvard Medical School. In addition to his medical career, he has been very active in the Taiwanese American Community. Dr. Chang has been instrumental in promoting the identity of Second Generation Taiwanese Americans. He was the President of the Taiwanese American Foundation (TAF) in Chicago and in charge of a TAF Summer Conference in 1985. He has also been the Program

Coordinator of the Youth Program at the Taiwanese American Conference/East Coast in 1987 and 1992.

Ms. Ya-Hui Wang

Ms. Wang has been widely praised for her focused, intelligent musicianship and her rare gift for communicating with both the orchestra and the public. She has also earned plaudits for the flair, maturity, and quiet confidence she displays, proving herself to be a conductor worthy of respect in a field traditionally dominated by men. Ya-Hui Wang signed an unprecedented five-year contract as Music Director of the Akron Symphony Orchestra (Ohio)

beginning in the 2000-2001 season. Previously she served as Assistant Conductor of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, where she was also Music Director of the Detroit Symphony's Civic Orchestra. Among her other impressive achievements was her appointment, in 1995, as Apprentice Conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. She has also previously served as Music Director of the Fort Smith Symphony (Arkansas), the Omaha Nebraska Youth Orchestras and the Principal Conductor of the Chicago Encore Chamber Orchestra. In the summer of 2000, she joined the Pacific Music Festival in Sapporo, Japan as their Associate Conductor.
